LEARN ABOUT OUR COLONIAL REGIONAL POLICE

HISTORY

In 1995 the municipalities of Bath Borough, Hanover Township and Lower Nazareth Township organized the Colonial Regional Police Commission to provide police services to their municipalities. Prior to 1995 Bath Borough had their own department, Hanover Township had been receiving police services from the Pennsylvania State Police and Lower Nazareth Township received contractual police services from Nazareth Borough. In January 2000 the department started to provide contractual police services to the Borough of Chapman. The total resident population of the jurisdiction is 17,734 persons.

COMMISSION

The Colonial Regional Police Commission is the governing and policy making body. The Chief of Police answers directly to the Commission and is charged with the overall supervision of the Department. Bath Borough, Hanover Township and Lower Nazareth Township are each represented by two elected officials from the municipality. One representative from each municipality is the primary delegate and one is an alternate. Each municipality has only one vote on Commission matters. An alternate can only vote on an issue in the absence of the primary delegate. Commission Members are appointed annually by their municipalities. The Commission Members annually elect a Chairman, Vice-Chairman and a Secretary-Treasurer. The Commission annually appoints a solicitor and a person to be the Commission Secretary.


BUDGET

The Commission develops and approves the annual budget of the Police Department. The share of the budget to be paid by each municipality is determined by a formula that consists of the Assessed Property Values of the Municipality, Per Capita Population and the Police incidents from the previous year. The 2003 Budget of the Police Department was \$1,702,370.54.

PERSONNEL

The Police Department became operational on October 1, 1995 and consisted of the Chief, eight officers and one

clerical person. On November, 1995 six more officers and a part-time clerical person were employed bringing the total complement to 17. As of March 15, 2004, the authorized complement is 24 employees; the Chief, two Detectives, a Lieutenant, four Sergeants, 13 Patrol Officers, two full time and one part time administrative staff.

PROGRAMS

The Department offers 24 hour a day, seven day a week service and provides K-9 services, D.A.R.E. instructions, Crime Prevention Programs, KIDS Card Program and Child Car Seat Safety Inspections. Members of the Department are active in drug enforcement as members of the Northampton County District Attorney's Drug Task Force and the Department is an active participant in the Lehigh Valley DUI Task Force.

EMPHASIS

Colonial Regional Police Department places strong emphasis on the enforcement of the Vehicle Code in the belief that the deaths, injuries and financial impact of automobile crashes cause more injury to citizens, their families and businesses than all types of other crimes together.

STATISTICS

In Year 2003, Colonial Regional Police Department investigated and/or responded to 9025 incidents or complaints and were involved in 4331 enforcement actions of violators of the Crimes Code, Vehicle Code or Municipal Ordinances.

DNA Package is Approved by House

The state House has approved a package of legislation that would make sweeping changes to criminal investigations through the use of DNA evidence.

DNA has the power to place someone at the scene of a crime and to clear the innocent of wrongdoing. It is a great investigative tool.

The DNA crime package contains seven bills that address a number of DNA-related crime issues.

A measure I authored, modeled

after a successful Colorado law, would exclude and exonerate innocent suspects in an investigation through DNA analysis. The measure would allow for law enforcement investigators to obtain a court order to require suspects to give a DNA sample.

The other measures:

Remove the statute of limitations for felonies and certain misdemeanor sex offenses in which the perpetrator can be identified through DNA evidence at a later date. If passed into law, the statute of limitations would lapse one year after the identity of the perpetrator is determined.

Make DNA samples mandatory whether or not a defendant was advised that a sample would be taken at the time he or she was convicted or adjudicated of a felony sex offense or other specified crime. DNA samples would also be taken from individuals on death row or sentenced to life in prison.

Allow for DNA samples to be taken from an eligible offender if not previously taken because of an oversight or error. The measure would also allow for another DNA sample to be taken if an initial sample is not adequate for proper identification. Expand the list of offenses for which DNA samples would be taken to include all felonies under Pennsylvania law. In addition to requiring that samples be taken upon a felony conviction, this would also include all individuals convicted of a felony who are serving prison terms when the law goes into effect, even if they were convicted before the effective start of the new law.

Mandate that law enforcement agencies inform parties filing missing person reports that they could submit a DNA sample or item belonging to the missing person along with the report. The agency that submits the report and samples would be required to notify the Pennsylvania State Police if the person is located and vice versa.

Require a DNA sample of unidentified human or fetal remains to be sent to the state police before a death certificate is issued.

Urge the U.S. Congress to expand the types of DNA samples that are stored in the federal database to include all the DNA information that is collected by Pennsylvania law enforcement. Currently, the database managed by the FBI does not permit the inclusion of samples permitted to be included in the Pennsylvania database.

If all the bills are enacted, the DNA crime bill package would put Pennsylvania at the forefront of using DNA to solve crimes, locate missing persons and identify human remains.

DNA is a chromosome molecule that carries genetic coding unique to each person. The only exception is identical twins.

Through laboratory process, DNA can be extracted from body tissues such as a strand of hair, semen or blood, and matched against DNA discovered at a crime scene or on a victim to scientifically implicate an accused.

All the measures were passed unanimously. The bills now go to the Senate for consideration.




The Recreation Department is excited to be able to offer this high quality newsletter to all of our residents. This mailing will be offered twice a year, spring/summer and fall/winter.

Teachers have been hard at work preparing math packs for our students to keep their math skills sharp during the summer (summer homework!).


Hanover's Spring Festival is set for Friday, June 4, from 4 to 8 pm—rain or shine. We hope you will come out and join us for this fun-filled evening.



IMPRESSIONS

ast November, Pennsylvania voters overwhelming approved two ballot questions paving the way for a new law allowing children to testify via videotape or closed-circuit television in criminal proceedings.



The referendum amended the state Constitution to allow the legislature to

implement such a law. The state Senate recently acted on that vote by approving Senate Bill 979, legislation that will amend the Judicial Code to incorporate the Pennsylvania Uniform Child Witness Testimony by Alternative Methods Act. The bill was sent to the House of Representatives for consideration.

Any change must balance concern for children with the rights of the accused. As a co-sponsor of SB 979, I can say that it strikes that balance. This legislation is intended to reduce the trauma child victims and child witnesses experience when testifying in court.

Under the measure, a judge could order a hearing to determine if the child needs to testify by an alternative method, such as videotape or closed-circuit television. The court could only order the presentation of testimony by a child victim or child material witness by an alternative method if it finds that testifying that in an open forum or in a face-to-face confrontation with the defendant would cause the child to suffer serious emotional distress that would substantially impair the child's ability to communicate.

Under SB 979, the alternative method could not be more restrictive of the rights of the parties than is necessary to serve the purposes of the order, and must permit a full and fair opportunity for examination and cross-examination of the child.

Prior to the 2003 referendum, the Pennsylvania Constitution guaranteed defendants the right to meet witnesses face-to-face in the courtroom. The change brings the state Constitution in line with the U.S. Constitution, which stipulates that a defendant has the right to be "confronted with the witnesses against him" but does not require that the two parties meet "face-to-face."

The "face-to-face" requirement has often made prosecution difficult in cases involving abuse of children. Children have frozen on the witness stand when asked to identify offenders. In one case, kindergarten students at a York County elementary school who were injured in a February 2001 attack by a machete-wielding man would have had to testify against their attacker face-to-face in court - and potentially suffer additional psychological trauma - had their assailant not pleaded guilty.

Crimes against children are an unfortunate reality, as is the need for child victims and witnesses to go through the court process if justice is to be served. But that doesn't mean we can't take reasonable steps to make the process the least traumatic as possible.

That's what voters said they wanted and that is what Senate Bill 979 will provide.

A Walk Through the Halls of Notre Dame of Bethlehem Elementary School

What will you hear?

You will hear the excitement of learning, as young minds are nurtured and challenged.

You will hear the thrill of new ideas being presented and grasped for the first time.

You will hear the patriotism of young Americans as they recite the Pledge of Allegiance.

You will hear the prayers of God's children as they thank their Creator and remember in prayer their families and friends and those who are in need.

What will you see?

You will see the joy of discovery as new science experiments are understood.

You will see the concern of teachers for students and students for their peers as all go through another day in the life-long journey of learning.

You will see the future leaders of our nation, our community, our businesses, our industries, our families as they prepare for the future.

You will see the reverence and respect of young people in school uniforms as they grow in their recognition of their responsibilities to God and each other.

What will you encounter?

+ Upon entering the doors of Notre Dame you can feel the energy of **Preschool** as they are learning through play and hands-on activities. Caterpillars seem to be the talk of the day. They are exploring the literature of Eric Carle and representing his art through a large classroom mural. In the science center, they are observing and measuring their growth and making predictions on their metamorphosis.

They can also be seen working on writing models as well as word families that will be used in first grade.

+ As you pass by **first grade**, you may wonder why all you can see is a room full of children in tall red and white striped hats. They are having a birthday party for Dr. Suess! At snack time they are all busy making AND eating "green eggs and ham" – a meal fit for a king – or rather a meal fit for the Cat in the Hat.

+ When you look in the **second grade** class, you may see some halos above the children's heads. As their First Holy Communion Day approaches, they are becoming more like little angels with each passing day. As a class, they have an Agape together to simulate how the early Christians gathered to celebrate Eucharist.

+ As you approach the **third grade**, you'll notice that parents have been invited to join their children for creative

You may not remove a live tree near the street without first obtaining a permit and permission from the Shade Tree Commission.

If a tree dies near the street, you must obtain a permit and then replace it with a tree from the Approved List.

Mulch your trees to protect the trunk and to conserve moisture during the summer: three inch depth with a three-foot diameter, no mulch touching the trunk.

Give your young trees a good soaking once a week during dry spells.

When pruning branches on your tree, do not leave a stump and do not cut too close to the trunk (see diagram in Tree Care Booklet available in Township Office).
