FIRST RESPONDERS PARK DEDICATION

Hanover Township "Thanks" First Responders by Dedicating a Park in their Honor

Tumerous Lehigh Valley municipalities think pretty poorly of your own need for public safety. Many of them have no police, choosing to let you wait for the time it takes Pennsylvania State Police to respond to what could be a life-and-death emergency. You could live in Bath Borough, which has scheduled a special Town hall. Or you could live in Allentown, whose fire engines are breaking down because Mayor Ed Pawlowski slashed their operating budget by 65.52% since 2008. That's just a tragedy waiting to happen. But things are different in Hanover Township, which is blessed with excellent police, fire and emergency medical protection. Instead of ignoring or maligning them, Hanover Township thanked its first responders on Saturday, April 29, 2017 by naming a park in their honor.

Supervisor Michel Prendeville came up with the name for this park, which was built

almost entirely with grant money. As the park was being dedicated, sirens wailed all over because first responders were spending their Saturday morning drilling for a hospital disaster that hopefully will never happen.

Prendeville's stirring words:

"Welcome to the dedication of Hanover Township's First Responders Park. The naming of this park is in the spirit of recognizing our first responders. Today's ceremony is an honor and an expression of Hanover Township's appreciation for our emergency response professionals and volunteers.

Our first responders – dispatchers, police, fire, ems, armed forces, emergency management professionals and countless volunteers are nothing short of heroes and heroines. They willingly and passionately practice their craft with bravery and selflessness. They serve with compassion while placing themselves in harm's way. Colonial Regional Police Chief Roy Seiple said that, unlike many other communities, Hanover Township has always gone out of its way to make first responders feel welcome. "The last few years have been very difficult for men and women in law enforcement," said Seiple. "Officers have been preyed upon at an alarming rate." In the midst of all the controversy over police nationwide, Chief Seiple said he arrived at work one morning to see the yellow line replaced with a black and blue line painted in the road outside of the police station. That was Prendeville's idea too. They also added a red and black front of the fire company facilities.

OPIATE EPIDEMIC — FBI CHASING THE DRAGON

- It can happen to anyone no matter what age, sex, gender, occupation and it does.
- You can become addicted with just one prescription of the medication.
- If you receive a prescription pain medication from your doctor for any reason PLEASE use CAUTION when taking them. You should only take them if absolutely needed. You should never take all of the pain medication if possible.
- Most pharmacies will fill a partial prescription for you. It the doctor prescribed 10 pills only fill ½ of the prescription. The pharmacy will hold the rest for you if needed. This is a good practice to make sure left over pills do not get into the wrong hands of someone else in your household.
- Educate yourself on the warning signs.
- Be aware of common slang terms such as "oxys" (oxy-codone) or "hydros" (hydrocodone).

STATISTICS

- In the 1960's more than 80% of opioid abusers got hooked on heroin first.
- In the 2000's 75% of opioid abusers started with prescription opioids.
- From In 2015 a total of 33,000 opioid-related deaths were reported across the nation.
- More than 10 million people 12 years and older in the U.S. reported nonmedical use of prescription opiates in 2014
- Each day 91 people in the U.S. die from an overdose of prescription painkillers.
- More than 93% of those identified as needing treatment for dependence or misuse of an illicit drug believe they do not need help.
- ❖ 47,000 people will die this year from a drug overdose

SYMPTOMS TO LOOK FOR (RED FLAGS)

Drowsiness and lack of energy

A potential sign a person may be addicted to opioids is that he or she looks tired. They may have drooping eyes and look as if they are about to fall asleep. The drowsiness causes the person to spend less time with their friends and skip out on activities they used to enjoy.

Inability to concentrate and lack of motivation

Opioids can diminish a patient's attention and concentration and interfere with day to day activities. They focus more on the drug and how they will get their next fix to avoid going into withdrawal. It makes it difficult for a person to concentrate and maintain their level of academic or work performance. This often results in obvious signs like

missing days of work, missing school or leaving school or work during the day.

Social behavioral changes

The frequent level of intoxication, drowsiness, tiredness and inability to concentrate often make it difficult for the addicted individual to maintain normal friendships and social habits they had prior to the addiction. They become more isolated and/or spending time with friends who are engaged in similar destructive behaviors.

Changes in Appearance

It can be difficult to tell when someone is high on opioids, but the most common physical signs include "pinpoint pupils" (pupils that stay constricted, even in dim room light). They may experience sudden itching of the arms, stomach or legs. They may also experience drooping eyes, head nodding, intense calm, slurred speech and flushing of the face and neck.

Symptoms of addicts experiencing painkiller with-drawal may include frequent yawning, runny nose, dilated pupils (pupils are large), sudden trips to the bathroom because of nausea, vomiting and diarrhea, joint pain (especially in the back and legs), "flu-like" feelings, and severe insomnia.

Increased secrecy

Loved ones abusing prescription painkillers have a basic requirement to lead a double life. Drug activity is by illegal and very high risk which causes the person to maintain a level of secrecy in their life. They may no longer want to be with their normal friends and start finding new friends who are participating in the same type of activity. They will do anything they can to get the drugs. They will steal from you and/or they may sell household items you have for money.

GRAY DEATH

A new and extremely dangerous opioid combo called "Gray Death" is on our streets. This new drug is not only deadly to the user it is also extremely dangerous for the First responders or anyone who comes in contact with the drug. This drug can be absorbed through the skin or accidently inhaled through the air. It is a toxic combination of heroin, fentanyl and a synthetic opioid named U-47700. It is a gray powder that looks similar to concrete.



EMS BILLING

Township residents are considered a "subscriber to our EMS division". If you need our services and have insurance we must bill your insurance company for services provided. When we are on an emergency call sometimes it is difficult to obtain all of the required information needed to bill your insurance company. We must have the patient's current insurance cards for both primary and secondary coverage and we must have the patient's signature prior to submitting to the insurance. If we are unable to obtain all of the required information our Billing Company which is located in Danville, PA will send you an invoice and it will state items needed from the patient to submit to your insurance.

If you have certain commercial insurances the insurance company will process the claim and send the patient the explanation of benefits form and the payment for services rendered. If you receive a check for services rendered by EMS you must forward the check to the fire company or our Billing Company.

Identify Signs Early to Prevent Tick-Borne Illness

Pennsylvania leads the nation in Lyme disease cases, with 7,351 confirmed cases in 2015 - or nearly a quarter of all U.S. cases. Preliminary numbers show an increase in 2016, and the mild winter meant an early start to tick activity in 2017. Lyme disease is often transmitted through the bite of an infected blacklegged tick, also known as a deer tick. Lyme disease is treatable, but there is no cure.

If identified early, Lyme disease can be treated with antibiotics. If Lyme disease goes undetected, it can spread to the joints, heart and nervous system. The most important thing

you can do is take proper precautions in the outdoors by wearing DEET-based insect repellant, long sleeve shirts and long pants, routinely checking for and removing any ticks, and showering after outdoor activity.

I recently signed onto a letter asking the Senate Appropriations Committee to support including funding in this year's budget to begin implementation of the 16 recommendations made by the Task Force on Lyme Disease and Related Tick-Borne Diseases. These areas focus on education and awareness, prevention and surveillance.

YARD WASTE INFORMATION REMINDER

The pickup will start in the northern most part of each sector on MONDAY (unless noted on the schedule available at www.hanovertwp-nc.org) and proceed southerly. Yard waste must be curbside NO LATER than 7:00 a.m. on the dates noted on the schedule. The yard waste truck will make only **one pass** through each sector during the week identified. This does not mean the entire sector will be picked up on Monday. Collection starts on Monday and proceeds southerly.

Material must be placed <u>curbside</u> either in the 92-gallon Township container, other rigid container or YARD WASTE BAGS available at most hardware or building material stores. Containers and/or bags, other than the 92-gallon barrels provided by the Township <u>must weigh less than 70 lbs.</u> Yard waste placed in plastic bags <u>will not</u> be collected.

YARD WASTE ACCEPTED MATERIAL

Leaves (1)

Small Brush – up to 4" in diameter (no longer than 6 feet, tied & bundled) Hedge & shrub trimmings, garden plants residue Christmas trees <u>free of</u> ornaments, lights, garland, tinsel & stands

YARD WASTE NOT ACCEPTED

Grass (2) Sod Tree Stumps

- (1) Leaves will be picked up starting the 2nd week of October continuing through the 1st week of December when raked to the curb.
- (2) Recycle your grass using a mulching mower or by cutting your lawn frequently and leaving the grass on the lawn. This does not contribute to thatch and provides an excellent fertilizer. You can place your grass out for the regular trash collection but this is not recommended by the Township or the Department of Environmental Protection.
- (3) Ornamental Grass will not be collected.

Yard waste is only picked up where residents place refuse and recycling curbside for collection. If you have questions, please contact the Township @ 610.866.1140, ext 224.

Not Accepted Materials:

Ceramics, dishes, window glass, mirrors, light bulbs, glass cookware, containers of hazardous or toxic materials, tissues or paper towels,, bound books, paper cartons for milk or juice, wax coated boxes, household appliances, toys, coat hangers, Styrofoam or plastic bags.

Street Sweeping and Grass Trimming

Twice a year all the main streets and at least once a year all the other streets in the Township are swept. Additionally, a third of the Township on an annual basis a third of the catch basins for the storm sewer system are cleaned. The Township staff requests that residents and businesses are cognizant of this fact when cutting their lawns. HOARDING AND FIRE: REDUCING THE RISK

Do you have a person in your life who may be a hoarder? Hoarding is a condition where a person has persistent difficulty discarding personal possessions. The large amount of possessions fill the home and prevent the normal use of the space. Living space becomes cluttered. It may be unusable. Hoarding brings distress and emotional health concerns.

Why Hoarding Increases Fire Risks

- ✓ Cooking is unsafe if flammable items are close to the stove or oven.
- ✓ Heating units may be too close to things that can burn. They might also be placed on unstable surfaces. If a heater tips over into a pile, it can cause a fire.
- Electrical wiring may be old or worn from weight of piles. Pests could chew on wires. Damaged wires can start fires.
- Open flames from smoking materials, candles, or fireplaces in a home with excess clutter are very dangerous.
- ✓ Blocked pathways and exits may hinder escape from a fire.

How Hoarding Impacts First Responders

- ✓ Hoarding puts first responders in harm's way.
- ✓ Firefighters cannot move swiftly through a home filled with clutter.
- Responders can be trapped in a home when exits are blocked. They can be injured by objects falling from piles.
- ✓ The weight of the stored items, especially if water is added to put of a fire, can lead to building collapse.
- ✓ Fighting fires is very risky in a hoarding home. It is hard to enter the home to provide medical care. The clutter impedes the search and rescue of people and pets.

How Can You Help Reduce the Risk of Fire Injury?

- ✓ When talking a person who hoards, focus on safety rather than the clutter. Be empathetic. Match the person's language. If they call it hoarding, then you can call it hoarding.
- ✓ Help the residents make a home safety and escape plan. Stress the importance of clear pathways and exits. Practice the plan often. Exit routes may change as new items are brought into the home.
- ✓ Install working smoke alarms in the home. Test them at least once a month.
- ✓ Reach out to community resources. Talk to members of the fire company to alert them of your concerns.

Over 4,000

township officials, exhibitors and guests participated in the four-day event. The purpose of the annual convention is to provide township officials with information to help them better serve their constituents and

to give them an opportunity to exchange ideas on important local government issues. During the

convention's business session, delegates adopted resolutions establishing the official policy of the state association. These resolutions will serve as guidelines for the association in pursuing legislation and regulations favorable to townships. Pennsylvania's 1,455 Townships of the Second

Class represent more than one-third of the state's population and make up the largest of the four types of municipal government in Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.

SHADE TREE ADVISORY BOARD

PLANT A TREE

Arbor Day has passed, but you can still plant a tree to maintain Hanover Township's "urban canopy", provide cooling shade in the summer, and add to your property value. Check the Hanover Township Approved Tree List for suitable trees. (Street trees must be selected from this list.)

MULCH YOUR TREES

Applying mulch in a circle at least three feet from the trunk has many benefits: maintains moisture during dry spells, keeps the soil an even temperature, and prevents lawn mower and weed wacker damage to the trunk. The mulch should be approximately three inches deep and NOT TOUCH THE TRUNK OF THE TREE.

EMERALD ASH BORER ALERT

Homeowners with ash trees in their yards or on the street should know that the emerald ash borer (EAB), a destructive insect introduced to the U.S. from Asia, is present in most counties of Pennsylvania and will appear in our area in the near future. Unless the trees are treated, 99% will die and have to be removed and replaced. More information can be found at www.emeraldashborer.info.

Largest concentration of ash trees is the Kathi Drive loop from Susan Drive to Susan Drive (4701 - 4783) and Toni Lane from Crawford Drive to Susan Drive

Other areas are Loraine Lane from Ashley Lane to Kathi Drive; Cheryl Drive by the condominiums and Southland Drive by the apartments. Others are located throughout the throughout the township.
